A SURVEY will be carried out into how open spaces and sports facilities across Bromsgrove meet residents' needs.

Their study in Bromsgrove will be compliant with current planning guidance and is set to investigate whether the existing open spaces and sports facilities in the district meet the needs of residents now, and whether they

It will home in on which open spaces are well used and valued by residents, and will include parks, woodlands, footpaths, outdoor sports facilities and pitches, facilities for children and young people, amenity green space within housing developments, allouments and even cements, allouments and even cem ments, allotments and even cem-eteries and churchyards.

The study will also consider the indoor sports facilities in the area, including swimming pools, sports halls, indoor bowls and indoor ten-
